- 1. Add "Confidential personal information" to the beginning of the rule's title. Because the Ohio Administrative Code does not have chapter titles and because many readers find rules by internet searches, adding the phrase will give context to the rule (in the absence of a chapter title) and optimizes the title for internet searches.
- 2. Replace occurrences of "confidential personal information" with "CPI" to shorten the rule.
- 3. Replace occurrences of "individual" that refer to an employee with "employee."
- 4. Replace "ODA employee" with "employee."
