This proposed new rule will exist to establish the process for designating a regional long-term care ombudsman program.

This proposed new rule will establish the process for designating a regional long-term care ombudsman program.

Because ODA's proposed amendments to the current version of this rule would amend approximately 50% of that rule, ODA proposes to adopt this new rule to replace the current rule in compliance with §4.3.1 of the Legislative Service Commission's Rule Drafting Manual. ODA's proposed new rule will achieve the following in comparison to the rule that it will replace:

1. Reduce the unnecessary use of the regulatory-restriction words "shall" and "require" in this rule to comply with R.C. §121.951.
2. Add "and may include the AAA serving the region to participate in the on-site visit" to the end of paragraph (A)(2) of this rule.
3. Delete the requirement for regional program to develop summary and action plans [paragraph (C)(2) of the current rule] since paragraph (C)(1) of this rule requires the SLTCO to develop these plans.
4. Change the deadline for a regional program's director, AAA, or sponsoring agency to comment on a summary and action plan from 30 days to 15 days.
5. Move the requirements for ombudsman plans in paragraph (B) of the current version of rule 173-14-24 of the Administrative Code to paragraph (D) of this proposed new rule, but only as will apply to sponsoring agencies seeking designation as a regional long-term care ombudsman program. [Proposed new rule 173-14-24 of the Administrative Code will retain a requirement for regional long-term ombudsman programs deemed to need additional oversight to address the same list.]
6. Make additional non-substantive improvements to this rule, including replacing the passive voice with the active voice to comply with §5.8.6 of the Rule Drafting Manual.
