## 3701-3-02 Diseases to be reported.

The diseases listed in this rule and classified as "Class A", "Class B", and "Class C" are declared to be dangerous to the public health and are reportable. The occurrence of cases or suspected cases of a disease classified as "Class A" "Class B" or "Class C" shall be d

reported to the board of health on forms as prescribed and provided by the director and shall be reported in accordance with this rule and Chapter 3701-3 of the Administrativ Code.
(A) The following diseases are classified as "Class A":
(1) Diseases of major public health concern because of the severity of disease of potential for epidemic spread:
(a) Anthrax
(b) Botulism, foodborne, other botulism as set forth in paragraph (A)(3) of this rule;
(c) Cholera;
(d) Diphtheria;
(e) Measles;
(f) Meningococcal disease;
(g) Plague;
(h) Rabies, human;
(i) Rubella (not congenital);
(j) Smallpox;
(k) Viral hemorrhagic fever (VHF);

(1) Yellow fever; and

(k)(m) Any unexpected pattern of cases, suspected cases, deaths or increased incidence of any other disease of major public health concern, because of the severity of disease or potential for <a href="mailto:epidemic">epimedicepidemic</a> spread, which may indicate a newly recognized infectious agent, <a href="mailto:an outbreak">an outbreak</a>, epidemic, related public health hazard or act of bioterrorism.

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(2) Diseases of public health concern needing timely response because of potential for epidemic spread:
