This rule is amended to implement the intent of a portion of SB294, by changing the annual reporting requirement to a biennial reporting requirement. Non-substantive corrections are proposed, and its 5-year review is accomplished by this rulemaking.

This rule provides the specific requirements of the report that is being changed from an annual report to a biennial report.
