This rule sets forth the Public Children Services Agency (PSCA) requirements for conducting a specialized assessment/investigation of abuse or neglect. Contact and interview requirements for child, family, parent/guardians, and alleged perpetrators are outlined for the assessment process regarding the safety and risk to the child.

Clarification language was added regarding interviewing a child who does not have sufficient verbal skills or if interviewing would be detrimental to the child.

The term "entity" has been changed to "organization" as defined in 2151.011 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Minor grammatical changes were made to this rule.

Certain changes to this rule are a direct result of the federal language requirements of Public Law 114-198 - The Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA) of 2016; and the Child Abuse and Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA), reauthorized in 2010. These federal requirements have resulted in changes to the screening process and required criteria which needs to be gathered for the plan of safe care in order to make an informed screening decision for infants and children and families impacted by the legal and illegal use of substances.

As a result of the passing of the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA), new procedures and processes have been introduced to public children services agencies. These new procedures and processes may result in additional time spent on case flow. It is not possible to estimate the cost of compliance to county public children

services agencies for the following reasons: 1. These processes and procedures are new, thus it is difficult to project the amount of time and resources which will need to be allocated. 2. The need for the new work flow will vary from county to county, based on the population and number of intakes received. Larger counties likely will receive more intake referrals which meet CARA criteria, thus increasing time spent on each case.
