Public Law 115-123, the Family First Prevention Services Act, allows for Title IV-E agencies to claim Title IV-E Foster Care Maintenance (FCM) for a child placed with a parent in a licensed residential family-based treatment facility for up to 12 months and for five year rule review.

This rule outlines the reimbursement criteria for children who are eligible for Foster Care Maintenance (FCM). Changes include: updating the revision date of the JFS 02911 "Single Cost Report" to 8/2018; adding a facility type, "substance use disorder (SUD) residential facility"; adding a paragraph for specific reimbursement requirements for SUD residential facilities; correcting the website for emanuals; and making grammar clarifications throughout the rule.

Private child placing agencies and private non-custodial agencies are required to be certified by the state of Ohio to provide substitute care.

There are no risks or civil penalties for non-compliance, but rather the risk of possible forfeiture of their certification through denial or revocation.

This rule requires the completion of the JFS 02911 "Title IV-E Single Cost Report" which details their placement costs and administrative costs for ODJFS to set minimum and maximum foster care maintenance rate ceilings for federal reimbursement.
