This rule is being proposed to update policy governing the administration of the Medicaid program.

This rule, 5160-10-03, describes the coverage of medical/surgical supplies, durable medical equipment, and supplier services by the Ohio Medicaid program. The appendix to the rule indicates whether an item is covered for all places of service, is covered only when it is provided in someone's personal residence, or is not covered when it is provided in a nursing facility.

This rule replaces current rule 5160-10-03. The body of the rule has been reorganized and streamlined, and unnecessary references have been removed. The nursing facility (NF) limitation on the coverage of oxygen and custom wheelchairs has been removed from appendix A. Form JFS 01913 (a certificate of medical necessity) is still referenced in the body of the rule, but it is no longer incorporated into the rule as appendix B.

The adoption of this rule will have no direct effect on aggregate Medicaid expenditures, because the effect of removing the nursing facility limitation on the coverage of custom wheelchairs and major wheelchair repairs is attributable to rules 5160-10-13 and 5160-10-16.

As a result of a legislative amendment in Amended Substitute House Bill 59 (130th General Assembly), nursing facility (NF) providers on the whole will experience a decrease in their Medicaid per diem payments, accompanied by the lifting of the obligation to pay for oxygen, custom wheelchairs, major wheelchair repairs, and transportation by ambulance or wheelchair van for their Medicaid-eligible residents. Fee-for-service providers of oxygen, custom wheelchairs, wheelchair repair, and transportation may now receive payment directly from Medicaid for services delivered to Medicaid-eligible residents.

The fiscal impact will be provider-specific, depending on each provider's current business model for the delivery of these services and on the payment agreement that had been reached between the provider and the NF.

Medicaid-eligible NF residents should not incur any costs because of the adoption of this rule.
