#### Public Hearing Notice Ohio Environmental Protection Agency Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 3745-112, "Consumer Products" Updates and Five-Year Rule Review

Notice is hereby given that the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, Division of Air Pollution Control (DAPC) is planning to amend rules in Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 3745-112 to adopt a more recent version of the Ozone Transport Commission (OTC) model rule for consumer products. DAPC has also completed a review of the rules in this chapter to fulfill the requirements of Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 106.03 and 106.031 (5-year review).

The rules in OAC Chapter 3745-112 contain regulations for the content of volatile organic compounds (VOCs) in consumer products sold, supplied, offered for sale, or manufactured for use in the state of Ohio. These rules were initially promulgated in 2007 as part of Ohio's strategy to attain the 1997 ozone National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS) by adopting the standards in the model rule developed by the OTC. The OTC develops model rules for states to consider when adopting consumer products regulations and has since provided updated versions of the model rules, called "phases", for states to consider in subsequent adoption or revision of Consumer Products standards.

The rules in OAC Chapter 3745-112 are currently based on the 2006 Phase II OTC model rule for Consumer Products. Ohio EPA is updating these rules to adopt more recent versions of the OTC model rule; specifically, up through the 2012 Phase IV OTC model rule (this includes adopting the limits in the 2010 Phase III model rule, as well as the 2013 technical update). This update is part of Ohio's strategy to attain the 2015 ozone NAAQS.

Pursuant to Section 121.39 of the Ohio Revised Code, DAPC was required to consult with interested parties affected by the rules before the Division formally adopts them. On December 22, 2021, these rules went out for a 30-day review by interested parties. Please see the rule synopsis, available electronically at the web address below, for a complete summary of the proposed rule amendments.

Pursuant to Part D of Title I of the CAA, Ohio EPA is required to establish a SIP for the attainment and maintenance of the NAAQS. The above-mentioned rules are a part of Ohio's SIP for attainment and maintenance of the 2015 ozone NAAQS and the proposed amendments will be submitted to United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) as a modification of the SIP.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING SPEECH**

Thank you for taking time to attend this hearing before Ohio EPA. The purpose of the hearing today is to obtain comments from any interested person regarding Ohio EPA's proposed rules.

The Division of Air Pollution Control is planning to amend rules in Ohio Administrative Code Chapter 3745-112 to adopt a more recent version of the Ozone Transport Commission (OTC) model rule for consumer products. DAPC has also completed a review of the rules in this chapter to fulfill the requirements of Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 106.03 and 106.031 (5-year review).

The rules in OAC Chapter 3745-112 contain regulations for the content of volatile organic compounds in consumer products sold, supplied, offered for sale, or manufactured for use in the state of Ohio. These rules were initially promulgated in 2007 as part of Ohio's strategy to attain the 1997 ozone National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS) by adopting the standards in the model rule developed by the OTC. The OTC develops model rules for states to consider when adopting consumer products regulations and has since provided updated versions of the model rules, called "phases", for states to consider in subsequent adoption or revision of Consumer Products standards.

The rules in OAC Chapter 3745-112 are currently based on the 2006 Phase II OTC model rule for Consumer Products. Ohio EPA is updating these rules to adopt more recent versions of the OTC model rule; specifically, up through the 2012 Phase IV OTC model rule (this includes adopting the limits in the 2010 Phase III model rule, as well as the 2013 technical update). This update is part of Ohio's strategy to attain the 2015 ozone NAAQS.

These rules have been filed with the Joint Committee on Agency Rule Review. Copies of the rules are available for public review on our website and in the handouts section in GoTo.

## Division of Air Pollution Control Response to Comments

#### Rule: OAC Chapter 3745-112, "Consumer Products"

Ohio EPA held a public hearing on May 6, 2022 and a 30-day comment period ending May 6, 2022 regarding proposed amendments to Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 3745-112, "Consumer Products". This document summarizes the comments and questions received at the public hearing and during the associated comment period, which ended on May 6, 2022.

Ohio EPA reviewed and considered all comments received during the public comment period. By law, Ohio EPA has authority to consider specific issues related to protection of the environment and public health.

In an effort to help you review this document, the questions are grouped by topic and organized in a consistent format. The name of the commenter follows the comment in parentheses.

#### General/Overall Concerns

**Comment 1:** Willert Home Products, Inc. ("Willert") timely submits the following comments in support of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency ("Ohio EPA"), Division of Air Pollution Control ("DAPC") proposed rule amendments in Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 3745-112, "Consumer Products Rule," currently under review by the Joint Committee on Agency Rule Review ("JCARR"). Specifically, Willert supports Ohio EPA's decision to retain Ohio's exemption from VOC limits for the "Toilet/Urinal Care Products" category under OAC 3745-112-03 Table 1 and from the definition of "Air freshener" under OAC 3745-112-01(7).

Willert makes certain consumer products, including toilet/urinal care products that it distributes in the State of Ohio and across the country, potentially regulated by Ohio's Consumer Products rule. Willert and others commented on Ohio's 2007 Consumer Products rule that certain products within the "Toilet/Urinal Care Products" category would be banned from sale in Ohio by the proposed 3% VOC limit. Ohio EPA appropriately re-evaluated this issue and decided not to regulate this product category at that time because "its reactivity is relatively low and it appears that current viable substitutes lack the performance aesthetics" of the products that would be banned by the 3% VOC limit. OAC Chapter 112 Response to Comments

(February 9, 2007). For the 2022 version of the Consumer Products rule, Ohio EPA sought comment on whether these reasons for the exclusion of Toilet/Urinal Care Products are still valid today.

Willert and others provided comments to Ohio EPA on the draft 2022 rule that verified the justification for excluding this category remains today. Based on these comments, DAPC properly "indicate[d] the justification for excluding this category remains appropriate and as such, the draft rule has been revised to remove the toilet/urinal category." OAC Chapter 3745-112 "Consumer Products" Response to Comments (April 2022). This decision is consistent with Ohio EPA's previous rulemaking and the state of the science for this category of products.

Specifically, Willert distributes a product that releases a deodorant compound for toilets and urinals very slowly over time. This slow release characteristic that is essential to its long-lasting benefit for customers is due to its low reactivity, which the California Air Resources Board (CARB) found in 2004 did not contribute significantly to VOC emissions or the formation of ozone. See CARB, Initial Statement of Reasons, IX-213 (May 7, 2004). Ohio EPA may continue to exempt these products from its Consumer Products VOC rule without negative effect on its goal of reducing ozone formation.

Willert can also confirm that substitute products with <3% VOC content continue to lack the performance aesthetics of the products in this category that would be banned if applying the OTC model rule to this category. Moreover, the substitute products contain pine oil or other air fresheners that are far more reactive. In fact, a small percentage of highly reactive VOC could contribute more to ozone formation than 98% of the very low reactive VOC contained in Willert's products. Additional information about these products was provided to Ohio EPA in Willert's comments on the draft Consumer Products rule and are incorporated here by reference.

DAPC's decision to exclude toilet/urinal care products from regulation under OAC Chapter 3745-112 also resolves an administrative issue. DAPC's Business Impact Assessment ("BIA") did not consider the negative economic effect of regulating these products for the first time, and effectively banning a product sold by Ohio businesses and relied upon by customers for long-lasting odor control benefits. Ohio EPA's decision to exclude the Toilet/Urinal Care product category means that the BIA "does not need to be revised to account for costs related to this category." OAC Chapter 3745-112 "Consumer Products" Response to Comments (April 2022). Any decision to regulate these products would necessitate revisiting the BIA for this rule.

For the reasons set forth above and in its previous comment to the original Revision, Willert commends DAPC for its decision to continue excluding the

Toilet/Urinal Care products category from Ohio's Consumer Products VOC rule at OAC Chapter 3745-112. (Kelly Webster, Willert Home Products)

- **Response 1:** Ohio EPA thanks Willert Home Products for their comment. The agency has taken it into consideration and will continue to exclude the Toilet/Urinal Care products category from Ohio's Consumer Products VOC rules.
- **Comment 2:** The Household & Commercial Products Association (HCPA) appreciates the opportunity to offer comments to the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (Ohio EPA), Division of Air Pollution Control (DAPC) on the proposal to update the rules in the Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 3745-112. This proposal is part of DAPC's comprehensive plan to achieve compliance with the national ambient air quality standard for ground-level ozone.

HCPA supports the long-standing commitment by DAPC to adopt regulatory provisions that are consistent with other states that have adopted more stringent volatile organic compound (VOC) limits for consumer products than the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (U.S. EPA) National Volatile Organic Compound Emission Standards for Consumer and Commercial Products. The proposal is based on the Ozone Transport Commission (OTC) 2012 Model Rule for Consumer Products (hereinafter referred to as "Phase IV OTC Model Rule"), updating from the OTC 2006 Model Rule for Consumer Products (hereinafter referred to as "Phase II OTC Model Rule"), and includes the 2013 technical update as well.

HCPA member companies manufacture and market more than two-thirds of the broad product categories governed by both DAPC's current regulation and the proposed amendments. HCPA has participated in the development of this proposal by offering comments to DAPC during the early stakeholder outreach and on the draft revisions. Most of the comments that HCPA provided were intended to identify revisions that will enhance consistency with the OTC Model Rule and the final consumer products regulations promulgated by Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Maryland, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island, and Utah. HCPA would like to thank DAPC for making these revisions. By developing consistent regulations, states can achieve improvements in air quality without imposing impediments to interstate commerce.

HCPA would also like to thank DAPC for modifying the effective date of the proposed amendments. While there are HCPA member companies that manufacture and market products on a nationwide basis and thus, these products already comply with the comparable VOC limits mandated by the current California regulation, there are other HCPA member companies that manufacture and/or distribute products on a regional basis and need a reasonable amount of time:

- Reformulate products to comply with the new VOC limits, conduct stability testing, efficacy testing and make the necessary changes to products labels and other documents such as Safety Date Sheets (SDSs) and Technical Data Sheet (TDSs); and/or,
- Make necessary changes in product distribution channels to ensure compliant products are supplied to retailers and distributors.

Reformulating products and changing distribution systems is an expensive process. Moreover, there are instances in which proposed federal and state regulations (impacting other issues not related to VOC regulations) have been withdrawn, postponed and altered unexpectedly – sometimes at the last minute. Consequently, companies do not expend time and money to reformulate products or to restructure distribution networks to comply with new regulations until these requirements have binding legal effect.

As HCPA requested a compliance date of one year after the date of publication of the final regulation to ensure sufficient time, HCPA can support an effective date of July 1, 2023, *provided* that the date of publication of the final regulation is on or before July 1, 2022. If the date of publication of the final regulation occurs after July 1, 2022, HCPA requests that the compliance date be delayed such that the new compliance date occurs one year after the publication of the final regulation so that companies have sufficient time to ensure compliant product is sold in the state of Ohio.

HCPA appreciates the opportunity to participate as an active stakeholder in DAPC's open and transparent public process to provide feedback on the proposed amendments to OAC Chapter 3745-112. HCPA is on record in Ohio and 16 other states (and the District of Columbia) as supporting regulations that are consistent with the OTC Model Rule.

National Aerosol Association Supports the HCPA comments and reiterates the concern of the effective date. (Doug Raymond, National Aerosol Association)

**Response 2:** Ohio EPA thanks Household & Commercial Products Association and the National Aerosol Association for their comments. Ohio EPA understands the concerns regarding implementation of the rules. As the agency has set the compliance date to July 1, 2023 (OAC 3745-112-03) and anticipates the

final rule will be effective prior to July 1, 2022. This will give affected manufactures at least one year to comply.

#### End of Response to Comments
