**RE: CSI Review – School Bus Standards** (OAC 4501-5-01 through 4501-5-04)

On behalf of Lt. Governor Mary Taylor, and pursuant to the authority granted to the Common Sense Initiative (CSI) Office under Ohio Revised Code (ORC) section 107.54, the CSI Office has reviewed the abovementioned administrative rule package and associated Business Impact Analysis (BIA). This memo represents the CSI Office's comments to the Agency as provided for in ORC 107.54.

## <u>Analysis</u>

This rule package consists of four rules – three amended and one no change rule – proposed by the Ohio Department of Public Safety (ODPS) as a five-year rule review as required by ORC 119.032. The draft rules address construction and design standards for pupil transportation vehicles and procedures for requesting alternative equipment uses for approval. There were no public comments received during the public comment period.

The proposed rules prescribe school bus construction standards, general provisions for new school buses and maintenance, requirements of school buses used to transport students with special needs, and the procedures for obtaining permission to change new or existing equipment.

The BIA describes a comprehensive stakeholder outreach process in which there were no comments or suggestions received.

Upon review of the proposed rules and BIA, the CSI Office determined that the rules satisfactorily meet the standards espoused by the CSI Office, and the purpose of the rules justifies the adverse impact identified in the BIA.

## **Recommendations**

For the reasons discussed above, the CSI Office does not have any recommendations for this rule package.

## **Conclusion**

Based on the above comments, the CSI Office concludes that the Ohio Department of Public Safety should proceed with the formal filing of this rule package with the Joint Committee on Agency Rule Review.
