- 6. What is the public purpose for this regulation (i.e., why does the Agency feel that there needs to be any regulation in this area at all)? R.C. 4729.532(A) requires the Ohio Veterinary Medical Licensing Board in conjunction with the State Board of Pharmacy to approve the drugs to be utilized by an employee of an animal shelter for euthanasia purposes. R.C. 4729.532(B) requires the Board to approve the curriculum for a euthanasia technician certification course.
- 7. How will the Agency measure the success of this regulation in terms of outputs and/or outcomes?

The success of the regulation will be measured by having rules written in plain language, compliance with the rules and minimal questions from those impacted regarding the provision of the rules.

#### **Development of the Regulation**

- 9. Please list the stakeholders included by the Agency in the development or initial review of the draft regulation.
  - The rule was distributed for initial public comment by posting the rule on the Board web site and sent to the Ohio Board of Pharmacy and the Ohio Veterinary Medical Association (OVMA).
- 10. What input was provided by the stakeholders, and how did that input affect the draft regulation being proposed by the Agency?). OVMA submitted recommendations for revision which were implemented. The Ohio Board of Pharmacy expressed their approval of the rule as proposed and edited. There were no comments submitted by the public.
  - At the December 11, 2019 board meeting, the Board members approved the rule and Business Impact Analysis to be filed with CSI.
- 11. What scientific data was used to develop the rule or the measurable outcomes of the rule? How does this data support the regulation being proposed? Scientific data was not used to develop or review this rule as it is required by law.

The rule addresses the fact that the Board of Pharmacy and the Ohio Veterinary Medical Licensing Board jointly approved the dangerous drugs to be used in an animal shelter setting for the process of euthanasia, the only other rule that applies to this area of practice was the Board of Pharmacy rule 4729.5:15-01 OAC.

- 13. Did the Agency specifically consider a performance-based regulation? Please explain. The Board did not consider a performance-based regulation for this rule. It is the Board's responsibility to ensure uniform practice standards across Ohio. The purpose of the rule is to provide guidance to the licensee and the public.
- 14. What measures did the Agency take to ensure that this regulation does not duplicate an existing Ohio regulation? The rule is specific to the euthanasia process as monitored by the Ohio Board of Pharmacy. This rule reflects the approval of the drugs utilized in Rule 4729-5-15-01 OAC. There are no other rules that provides the same approval as reviewed by the Director.
- 15. Please describe the Agency's plan for implementation of the regulation, including any measures to ensure that the regulation is applied consistently and predictably for the regulated community.

The rules will be posted on the Board's web site of which notification is sent to the Board's listserve, distributed through the Board's newsletter and relayed by the Board at trade association conferences. Any issues that might arise as a result of the rule will come before the Board members at one of their monthly board meetings for discussion. Interested parties are also able to request time on the Board Agenda to discuss issues that might arise as a result of how a rule is written or implemented. The discussion will then be reflected in the board minutes which are posted monthly on the Board web site at <a href="https://www.ovmlb.ohio.gov">www.ovmlb.ohio.gov</a>. Any pertinent issues related to the rule will be done in consultation with the appropriate representative from the OVMA or OAVT, the Department of Agriculture, the Ohio Board of Pharmacy, The Ohio State University College of Veterinary Medicine and/or other state agencies whose regulations may impact the practice of veterinary medicine.

#### Adverse Impact to Business

The board licenses veterinarians and registered veterinary technicians. The rule impacts veterinarians, veterinary technicians, and euthanasia technicians, who practice in animal shelters. Additionally, the rule will enlarge the capability of the national providers of education for euthanasia technician to provide education opportunities in the State of Ohio. The rule eliminates the lab portion to be taught by an Ohio licensed practitioner and expands the ability for a veterinarian or registered veterinary technician to provide education who are licensed in other states or jurisdictions.

- b. Identify the nature of all adverse impact (e.g., fees, fines, employer time for compliance,);
  - This rule only indicates approval of the dangerous drugs listed in the Ohio Board of Pharmacy Rule 4729:5-15-01 and the approval of the euthanasia technician euthanasia course. There are no fines are fees associated with this rule.
- c. Quantify the expected adverse impact from the regulation. The rule requires the euthanasia course to be at least sixteen hours in length as defined in R.C. 4729.532.
- 17. Why did the Agency determine that the regulatory intent justifies the adverse impact to the regulated business community? The joint approval of the euthanasia drugs by the Ohio Board of Pharmacy and the Ohio Veterinary Medical Licensing Board is meant to provide uniform regulations for the security, storage and usage of the dangerous drugs as well as provision of standard education.

#### Regulatory Flexibility

- 18. Does the regulation provide any exemptions or alternative means of compliance for small businesses? The rule does not provide any exemptions or alternative means of compliance for small businesses. The rule applies to all animal shelters no matter the size of the facility or population it serves.
- 19. How will the agency apply Ohio Revised Code section 119.14 (waiver of fines and penalties for paperwork violations and first-time offenders) into implementation of the regulation? There are no fines are penalties association with this rule.
- 20. What resources are available to assist small businesses with compliance of the regulation? The Board staff are available by telephone and via email to address questions or concerns. The Board members and staff provide presentations to the trade association conferences and the veterinary college. Additionally, the Board disseminates a bi-annual newsletter that addresses any law and rule changes impacting the practice of veterinary medicine.

# 4741-1-23 <u>Approval of Euthanasia Agents and</u> Euthanasia technician certification course curriculum

- (A)Pursuant to division (A) of section 4729.532 of the Revised Code, the board approves the use of tiletamine and zolazepam for injection and ketamine hydrochloride for anesthetizing an animal and xylazine for the purpose of sedating an animal as part of the euthanasia process in an animal shelter.
- (B) Euthanasia technician certification course curricula shall include, but are not limited to, the requirements listed in division (B) of section 4729.532 of the Revised Code.
- (A) (1) The course will be a minimum of sixteen hours and shall include information on the following areas:
- (1) (a) The pharmacology, proper administration, and storage of <u>anesthetizing and sedative agents</u> and euthanasia solutions;
- (2)(b) Federal and state laws regulating the storage and accountability of <u>anesthetizing and</u> <u>sedative agents and</u> euthanasia solutions;
- (3) (c) Euthanasia technician stress management;
- (4) (d)Proper disposal of euthanized animals.
- (B) (2) The curriculum must be submitted in writing to the Ohio veterinary medical licensing board for consideration and approval. Requirements for courses submitted to the board for consideration and approval shall include, but are not limited to,
- (1)(a) A copy of the course curriculum;
- (2)(b) Detailed learning objectives and the teaching methods used to achieve them;
- (3) (c) Classroom and laboratory hours devoted to each area of instruction as designated in division (A) of section 4729.532 of the Revised Code;
- (4) (d) The supervision of a veterinarian or a registered veterinary technician, who must be currently licensed in the state of Ohio, in the laboratory portion of the course presentation.

Candidates who have successfully completed the approved course shall be given a written certificate which includes: candidate's name; the name of the approved course; date of completion and the location where the course was given.
