The Common Sense Initiative is established in R.C. 107.61 to eliminate excessive and duplicative rules and regulations that stand in the way of job creation. Under the Common Sense Initiative, agencies must balance the critical objectives of regulations that have an adverse impact on business with the costs of compliance by the regulated parties. Agencies should promote transparency, responsiveness, predictability, and flexibility while developing regulations that are fair and easy to follow. Agencies should prioritize compliance over punishment, and to that end, should utilize plain language in the development of regulations.

 - OAC 5101:2-9-25 entitled "Residential parenting facility and crisis care facility location and programmatic requirements" provides guidance to agencies on the requirements of a residential parenting facility. The rule has been amended adding new language allowing the agency to maintain current residents to the age of nineteen.

The rule sets up structure for the provision of permitted actions and services when children are in an out of home placement within a residential facility.

The implementation of the rule and subsequent outcomes are monitored through the certification process.

Development of the Regulation

9. Please list the stakeholders included by the Agency in the development or initial review of the draft regulation.

The rule went through the public clearance on July 31, 2023, through August 14, 2023. There were no comments provided. ODJFS will proceed with the language provided by The Highlands residential program which initiated the rule amendment.

10. What input was provided by the stakeholders, and how did that input affect the draft regulation being proposed by the Agency?

The Highlands residential program contacted ODJFS, Office of Families and Children (OFC) due to experiencing residents reaching the age of majority but yet had more needs for services. They requested rule change to allow expectant mothers and mothers of infants to remain until the age of nineteen. ODJFS understood this was fundamentally necessary for the wellbeing of the new parents and infants, therefore the rule is being amended to allow the extension of services.

11. What scientific data was used to develop the rule or the measurable outcomes of the rule? How does this data support the regulation being proposed?

No scientific data was used to develop the rules.

12. What alternative regulations (or specific provisions within the regulation) did the Agency consider, and why did it determine that these alternatives were not appropriate? If none, why didn't the Agency consider regulatory alternatives? Alternative regulations may include performance-based regulations, which define the required outcome, but do not dictate the process the regulated stakeholders must use to comply.

No alternative regulations were considered for rule 5101:2-9-25 as the rule is driven by statute.

13. What measures did the Agency take to ensure that this regulation does not duplicate an existing Ohio regulation?

There is no duplication as the rules are specific to residential facilities and no other rule addresses these specific issues. The rule was reviewed by the legal staff and rule developers at ODJFS prior to the clearance process to ensure it did not duplicate any existing Ohio regulations.

14. Please describe the Agency's plan for implementation of the regulation, including any measures to ensure that the regulation is applied consistently and predictably for the regulated community.

Adverse Impact to Business

The impact will vary based on how many residents at any one time are being served with the total being five expecting or parenting mothers with a capacity of ten which includes their children.

This residential facility is a grant recipient through the Department of Health and Human Services that would cover the funding for these youth. The remaining cost could be as high as \$222 per day.

16. Are there any proposed changes to the rules that will <u>reduce</u> a regulatory burden imposed on the business community? Please identify. No, a reduction in a regulatory burden is not proposed but neither will this increase any regulatory burdens.

17. Why did the Agency determine that the regulatory intent justifies the adverse impact to the regulated business community?

To ensure the safety of children in substitute care, the adverse impact of the rule is necessary.
