This rule defines the Community Psychiatric Supportive Treatment (CPST) service and also identifies what it is not, e.g., it is not a day treatment, partial hospitalization, intensive outpatient, adaptive/habilitative or educational service or program. It also more clearly articulates requirements for provision of the service that are within the limits of related state and federal policies, rules and regulations.

This rule also describes how providers may provide the CPST service via real-time interactive videoconferencing. If utilizing real-time interactive videoconferencing, providers must assure that the equipment used has sufficient speed and resolution to assure quality and must further assure the security of the connection to provide for confidential communication.

There is no anticipated additional cost of compliance for School Districts relative to the provision of the CPST service itself. However, compliance with this rule may result in a shift in distribution of taxpayer dollars from the community mental health setting to the educational setting or to the autism scholarship program. It is not possible to provide an estimate in dollars, since any shift in spending is dependent upon provider compliance/non-compliance.

There is no anticipated additional cost of compliance for county mental health boards relative to the CPST service itself. There may even be a cost reduction realized since, as was previously noted, increased compliance with this rule by contract agencies of the mental health boards should result in a more equitable, fair and legal use of existing expenditures as they relate to the provision of the CPST service to all eligible consumers of the service.

With regard to interactive videoconferencing, the cost of compliance by county mental health boards is unknown at this time. The use of videoconferencing by mental health service providers is an OPTIONAL method of providing an existing service, and we are unable at this time to determine with any precision how many providers may choose to utilize this option for the purpose of providing the CPST service.
