The rule defines Participant-Directed Homemaker/Personal Care and sets forth provider qualifications, requirements for service delivery and documentation of services, and payment standards for the service. The Department is amending the rule to increase payment rates for providers of Participant-Directed Homemaker/Personal Care, require providers of Participant-Directed Homemaker/Personal Care to utilize electronic visit verification in accordance with rule 5160-1-40 of the Administrative Code, and correct citations to administrative rules.

These activities consume applicant/provider resources, the cost of which varies by applicant/provider and is unknown to the Department. The rule requires persons providing the service to be trained. Training consumes staff resources and there may be a cost associated with obtaining the training from another entity.
