As part of its Next Generation of Managed Care, and in partnership with the Governor's Children's Initiative and other child-serving state agencies, the Ohio Department of Medicaid (ODM) is designing a reimagined Medicaid system and structure to better serve children and youth who have complex behavioral health and multi-system needs through the Ohio Resilience through Integrated Systems and Excellence (OhioRISE) Program. The OhioRISE program also incudes a 1915(c) waiver that allows for additional services to be available to youth who meet the eligibility criteria to be enrolled onto the waiver as described in this rule.

The OhioRISE Program, operated by ODM, is a managed care prepaid inpatient health plan (PIHP) for children with behavioral health needs who are often served by multiple delivery systems in the state.
