The Common Sense Initiative was established by Executive Order 2011-01K and placed within the Office of the Lieutenant Governor. Regulatory Intent

This rule outlines the requirements that must be met for a physical therapist to assess and clear a youth to return to practice of competition. The content of the rule is based on the final report issued by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

- 5. What is the public purpose for this regulation (i.e., why does the Agency feel that there needs to be any regulation in this area at all)?

In HB 143 of the 129th GA and HB 487 of the 130th GA, the Ohio General Assembly adopted laws governing return to play decisions for youth sports. As part of this process, section 3707.521 of the Revised Code was enacted. Under division (E) of this section, a licensing agency must adopt rules establishing standards that are equal to or stronger than the guidelines developed by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee if it seeks to have its licensees authorized to assess and clear athletes for return to practice or competition.

6. How will the Agency measure the success of this regulation in terms of outputs and/or outcomes?

Success will be measured by licensees safely making return to play decisions in accordance with the guidelines established by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

Development of the Regulation

7. Please list the stakeholders included by the Agency in the development or initial review of the draft regulation.

The content of the draft regulation was based on the information contained in the Final Guidelines Report issued by the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

8. What input was provided by the stakeholders, and how did that input affect the draft regulation being proposed by the Agency?

The Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee published its final report in March 2015 following receipt and review of extensive testimony by experts who routinely treat youth sports concussions and head injuries. The Ohio Revised Code directs the Board to adopt rules by September 17, 2015, that implement the recommendations contained in the final report.

9. What scientific data was used to develop the rule or the measurable outcomes of the rule? How does this data support the regulation being proposed?

The Committee was made up of professional licensees with expertise in treating youth sports concussions and head injuries. The Committee heard extensive testimony while developing guidelines. The Committee relied upon and directed licensees to meet the "Zurich Guidelines" which is the "Consensus Statement on concussion in sport: the 4th International Conference on Concussion in Sport held in Zurich, November 2012." The Board is incorporating the Zurich Guidelines by reference in the proposed rule.

10. What alternative regulations (or specific provisions within the regulation) did the Agency consider, and why did it determine that these alternatives were not appropriate? If none, why didn't the Agency consider regulatory alternatives?

The Board did not consider alternative regulations because the statutory mandate required compliance with the specific and detailed minimum standards determined in the Final Guidelines Report of the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

11. Did the Agency specifically consider a performance-based regulation? Please explain. Performance-based regulations define the required outcome, but don't dictate the process the regulated stakeholders must use to achieve compliance.

The Board did not consider performance-based regulations because the statutory mandate required compliance with the specific and detailed minimum standards determined in the Final Guidelines Report of the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee.

12. What measures did the Agency take to ensure that this regulation does not duplicate an existing Ohio regulation?

This question does not apply to this rule.

13. Please describe the Agency's plan for implementation of the regulation, including any measures to ensure that the regulation is applied consistently and predictably for the regulated community.

The statutory mandate required compliance with the specific and detailed minimum standards determined in the Final Guidelines Report of the Ohio Youth Sports Concussion & Head Injury Return-to-Play Guidelines Committee. The Board will implement the regulations while using its website, email listsery, and social media to update and inform licensees and other stakeholders.

Individuals are required to have a license and meet various conditions for licensure to provide youth concussion assessment and clearance. The rule recommends that a portion of the required continuing education be focused on youth concussion assessment and clearance.

The requirement to use a specific form developed by the Ohio Department of Health could create additional work that is not currently required by licensees.

15. Why did the Agency determine that the regulatory intent justifies the adverse impact to the regulated business community?

The Ohio General Assembly determined that the established of these requirements were necessary to ensure public safety.
