The Common Sense Initiative was established by Executive Order 2011-01K and placed within the Office of the Lieutenant Governor. Under the CSI Initiative, agencies should balance the critical objectives of all regulations with the costs of compliance by the regulated parties. - 4715-7-03 Limited resident's license, limited teaching license, limited continuing education license display.: This rule sets forth the guidelines for display of limited resident's licenses, limited teaching licenses, and limited continuing education licenses.

O.R.C. 4715.03 Board organization - examinations.

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3. Does the regulation implement a federal requirement? Is the proposed regulation being adopted or amended to enable the state to obtain or maintain approval to administer and enforce a federal law or to participate in a federal program? If yes, please briefly explain the source and substance of the federal requirement.

This regulation does not implement a federal requirement nor was it implemented to enable the state to obtain or maintain approval to administer and enforce a federal law or to participate in a federal program.

4. If the regulation includes provisions not specifically required by the federal government, please explain the rationale for exceeding the federal requirement.

This question is not applicable since the regulation does not implement a federal requirement.

5. What is the public purpose for this regulation (i.e., why does the Agency feel that there needs to be any regulation in this area at all)?

O.R.C. 4715.03 requires the Ohio State Dental Board to regulate eligibility criteria, application procedures, and safety standards for the practice of dentistry in Ohio. These regulations allow the Board to carry out its statutory mission to ensure protection of the public.

6. How will the Agency measure the success of this regulation in terms of outputs and/or outcomes?

The rule is not a quantitative regulation, nor does it impose a measureable (if any) quantitative burden on the licensee. The success of the regulation will be measured by the licensees understanding or legal objections to the rule.

Development of the Regulation

7. Please list the stakeholders included by the Agency in the development or initial review of the draft regulation.

If applicable, please include the date and medium by which the stakeholders were initially contacted.

The Board's Law and Rules Review Committee (Committee), holds open meetings throughout the rule review year. The Committee is comprised of fourteen (14) members including representatives of the Board, the Ohio Dental Association and the Ohio Dental Hygienists' Association. Additionally, the Board sends public notices and proposed Rule Review agendas to the Board mailing list; a listing of parties interested in all Board proceedings. The Committee met with the opportunity to discuss these rules in April, September, and December 2013.

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8. What input was provided by the stakeholders, and how did that input affect the draft regulation being proposed by the Agency?

Discussion by the Committee resulted in the conclusion that this rule is working as intended by the legislature and that no changes were needed at this time.

9. What scientific data was used to develop the rule or the measurable outcomes of the rule? How does this data support the regulation being proposed?

Scientific data was not used to develop the rule as the rule is not data driven.

10. What alternative regulations (or specific provisions within the regulation) did the Agency consider, and why did it determine that these alternatives were not appropriate? If none, why didn't the Agency consider regulatory alternatives?

No alternative regulations were considered by the agency since it was determined that the rule provides the specific clarity required by O.R.C. 4715.16 and O.R.C. 4715.17.

11. Did the Agency specifically consider a performance-based regulation? Please explain. Performance-based regulations define the required outcome, but don't dictate the process the regulated stakeholders must use to achieve compliance.

The Board did not see an application for the rule in this package to be performance-based.

12. What measures did the Agency take to ensure that this regulation does not duplicate an existing Ohio regulation?

The five-year rule review process is conducted with a focus on eliminating obsolete, unnecessary, and redundant rules and avoiding duplication. In addition, the Committee meetings involved interested parties to help ensure that these rules do not duplicate any existing Ohio regulation.

13. Please describe the Agency's plan for implementation of the regulation, including any measures to ensure that the regulation is applied consistently and predictably for the regulated community.

These types of limited licenses have been implemented since 1953 and the Board continues to work to improve efficiency and effectiveness.

All licensed dentists under O.R.C. 4715.16 must have a license in order to provide services and dental care to Ohioans. The law does not differentiate on the size of the business and therefore, applies to all limited license holders.

17. How will the agency apply Ohio Revised Code section 119.14 (waiver of fines and penalties for paperwork violations and first-time offenders) into implementation of the regulation?

O.R.C. 4715 does not allow for the implementation of fines or penalties. Therefore, this is not applicable.

18. What resources are available to assist small businesses with compliance of the regulation?

Resources available to assist small businesses with compliance are the Boards law, rules, and policies online at the Boards website. Additionally, Board staff respond verbally and in writing to queries from interested parties.

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LIMITED LICENSES

4715-7-03 LIMITED RESIDENT'S LICENSE, LIMITED TEACHING LICENSE, LIMITED CONTINUING EDUCATION

LICENSE DISPLAY.

- (A) The limited resident's license and the limited continuing education license granted under the provisions of section 4715.16 of the Revised Code, shall be kept on file at the school, institution, or facility wherein the license holder practices, and shall be made immediately available to agents of the board upon request.
- (B) The limited teaching license granted under the provisions of section 4715.16 of the Revised Code, shall be displayed in a conspicuous place in the school, institution, or facility where the person is authorized to practice or teach.
