The Common Sense Initiative is established in R.C. 107.61 to eliminate excessive and duplicative rules and regulations that stand in the way of job creation. Under the Common Sense Initiative, agencies must balance the critical objectives of regulations that have an adverse impact on business with the costs of compliance by the regulated parties. Agencies should promote transparency, responsiveness, predictability, and flexibility while developing regulations that are fair and easy to follow. Agencies should prioritize compliance over punishment, and to that end, should utilize plain language in the development of regulations.

Regulatory Intent

2. Please briefly describe the draft regulation in plain language. Please include the key provisions of the regulation as well as any proposed amendments.

This rule states the additional requirements for licensure in Ohio for individuals who were educated outside of the United States in a program that was not accredited by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education. In short, applicants for a physical therapist or physical therapist assistant license must:

- 1. Have their education deemed equivalent to a US program by an independent evaluation company;
- 2. Pass the National Physical Therapy Examination;
- 3. Achieve minimum scores on a test of English language.

It is this first item that this rule change impacts. In House Bill 33, the legislature made changes to the standard that must be met for foreign education. Under previous law, the standard was to be equivalent based on the date when the applicant was licensed in a different country. However, many other countries do not require licensure. So, the law requires them to meet today's educational standard, which may be much higher than when they originally went to school and disregards many years of practice experience.

The law change, which is mirrored in this rule, would allow their educational standard to be based on when they completed their educational coursework in the other country, if that country does not require licensure.

Ohio law requires individuals to meet an equivalent education standard to a US applicant in order to practice physical therapy in Ohio.

Successful licensure of equivalent candidates for licensure.

The OTPTAT Board is required by ORC 4755 to regulate physical therapy in the state of Ohio. Ensuring that educational standards are met are part of that duty so that Ohioans are confident in receiving physical therapy care by a qualified individual.
